Desert Starts is a free exhibition comprising the works of 12 artists from Utopia, a region spanning many thousands of kilometres to the northeast of Alice Springs, including pieces by First Nations artist Selina Teece Pwerl, known for bringing the canvas to life through images of spinifex, gum blossom flowers, kurrajong seeds and landscape representations of her Father's Country.
